New Paltz is accredited by NASAD, the National Association of Schools of Art and Design, which offers guidelines on the content and credit distribution for B.S. Visual Art degrees, including those (like ours) that provide general art/design study within a liberal arts framework. Specifically, NASAD notes that "studies in art and design normally total between 30-45% of the total curriculum." This proposed revised credit increase is from 54 to 57 credits (total degree credit is 120). The credits percentage increase is from 45% to 47.5% of the total degree, which maintains a reasonable alignment with the average percentage of credits put forth by NASAD. *[Underlined text clarifies NASAD guidance for LA studio art programs.]*

Furthermore, NASAD “encourages institutions with the appropriate resources to be creative in the development of multidisciplinary curricula with artistic, intellectual, pragmatic, and professional objectives.” The program revision enables B.S. Visual Arts students to take full advantage of the academic resources that New Paltz offers. This new requirement supports the multidisciplinary approach NASAD recommends and provides an opportunity for students to develop a unique knowledge base, skill set, and disposition that will enhance their personal satisfaction as well as their professional skill sets. A new required course (ARS364 Work in Progress Review I and the revised ARS365 Work in Progress Review II) will support integration of the required minor with students’ studio work. Both ARS364 and ARS365 provide scaffolded continuation assists students in making and articulating connections between their areas of academic and studio interest by providing essential links established with ARS112 Art Seminar (taken in the freshman year) and culminated with ARS491 Creative Arts Projects (taken the final semester of the Senior year).

Lastly, please note all the above NASAD guidelines were carefully reviewed and discussed with David Cavallaro, Art Department Associate Chair and NASAD specialist and primary coordinator of the departmental NASAD report. From that perspective, Mr. Cavallaro finds this program revision to be within NASAD recommendations.

The revision is an addition of the two, 1.5-credit courses; ARS364 Work in Progress Review I and ARS365 Work in Progress Review II, which B.S. Visual Arts students are required to take in the revised program. In terms of anticipated costs, this revision will potentially reduce faculty assignment from 6 credits to 3 credits (two, 1.5-credit faculty assignments) per year.
