### Department of Political Science & International Relations Proposed revision to the Minor in International Relations

**Describe & Explain the Proposed Revisions:** The <u>current</u> IR minor is a **19 credit – interdisciplinary minor** with the following requirements:

- 1. **Required: POL 227**: Introduction to International Politics (4 cr.)
- 2. **Required: ANT 214:** Principles of Cultural Anthropology OR **GEO 271:** Environment & Culture OR **ANT404:** Political Anthropology.
- 3. **Required: POL 366:** Contemporary American Foreign Policy OR **HIS 469:** US Foreign Policy since 1900.
- 4. Three **elective** courses accepted for the International Relations minor, only one of which may be lower division.

A maximum of two courses used to meet the Minor requirements can be used for a distinct major/minor. A minimum grade of C- is required for the course to count towards the minor.

(The full catalogue description appears at the end of this document)

Our goal in revising the International Relations minor is to SIMPLIFY the minor to better enable students to complete it while also bringing it into alignment with the Political Science minor (PS minors take one introductory level course and five electives).

#### The proposed IR minor will remain 19 credits with the following requirements:

- 1. **Required: POL 227:** Introduction to International Politics (4 cr.)
- 2. **Elective:** Five courses (15 credits) accepted for the International Relations minor.

#### Notes:

- a. Two of the electives (6 credits minimum) must be POL. The remaining three electives (9 credits) may be from any department whose courses have been approved as counting towards a degree in International Relations.
- b. Of the five elective courses, only one may be lower division (3-4 credits).
- c. A maximum of two courses used to meet the minor requirements can be used for a distinct major/minor.
- d. A minimum grade of C- is required for courses to count towards the minor.
- e. Up to three internship credits may be applied towards the minor.

How does the revised minor relate to overall curricular goals and learning outcomes of the proposing department? The revised minor will align with the existing Political Science minor offered by the department. Our goal is to simplify accessibility for students while retaining the interdisciplinary nature of the minor.

In a spring 2024 retreat, department members agreed on the goals of an IR minor. These goals include providing our students with basic knowledge about the discipline of International Relations through the Introduction to International Politics (POL 227); and ensuring students have maximum flexibility to study those aspects of international relations that interest them. Students may take

accepted courses from across related disciplines (sociology, anthropology, geography, economics, history, black studies, WGSS, LLC).

# The following are the Political Science & International Relations Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Describe and explain the basic concepts and theoretical approaches in the discipline.
- 2. Describe and explain the content, issues, concerns & debates in disciplinary subfields (in this case the subfield is International Relations).
- 3. Use mastery of concepts & content to relate the historical to the present nature of politics & governance.
- 4. Apply theories and research methods to understand new and complex phenomena.
- 5. Relate theoretical approaches with practice through internships.
- 6. Develop writing skills, the ability to develop a coherent & structured argument as part of their research papers.
- 7. Possess oral communication skills allowing engagement in discussion and exchange of ideas and concepts.
- 8. Possess a sense of the responsibilities of citizenship and a sense of personal political efficacy/engagement.

### The SLOs relevant to the minor remain unchanged – these include numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 8.

Plans for evaluating the success of the revised minor: The minor will be evaluated based upon enrollment numbers, SEIs, and student performance on course assessments tied to the state learning outcomes.

**Catalogue Description**: The interdisciplinary International Relations minor enables students to learn and apply basic concepts and tools used by international relations scholars. Students also gain basic familiarity with the kinds of questions IR scholars ask and how the international system works.
