ANTHROPOLOGY MAJOR: REQUIREMENTS, ELECTIVES, CONCENTRATIONS

The Anthropology major requires 36 total course credits plus a zero-credit "field engagements" requirement.

Course Credits

Course credits combine required core courses (21 credits) and electives (15 credits). Core courses consist of three foundational classes (Principles of Archaeology-ANT 213, Principles of Cultural Anthropology-ANT 214, and Principles of Biological Anthropology-ANT 215) typically taken during the second and third years, followed by four upper-level courses taken in this recommended sequence:

3rd Year Fall Semester Anthropologies of Inequality (ANT 393)

Spring semester Histories of Anthropological Thought (ANT 480)
4th Year Fall Semester Research Methods in Anthropology (ANT 402)

Spring Semester Capstone Seminar (ANT 490)

Concentrations

As a major, you pursue a general field of study, or select one of two concentrations: "Gender, Health & the Body" or "Representation & Identity."

- For students desiring a comprehensive foundation, the general option offers an in-depth study of the
 three traditional subfields of archaeology, biological anthropology, and cultural anthropology, affording
 a broad understanding of human cultural diversity and evolution across time and space.
- The **Gender, Health & the Body** concentration emphasizes the intersections of gender, health, and bodily practices within diverse cultural contexts. This concentration encourages students to critically analyze how gender roles, human biology, and health practices are shaped by and, in turn, shape cultural beliefs and social structures.
- The **Representation & Identity** concentration explores how cultural identities are constructed, maintained, and transformed through various forms of representation. This concentration focuses on how media, performance, material culture, and visual culture in shaping identities and social relations.

For whichever concentration you choose, you take 15 credits of upper-division electives (five courses). Four must be associated with your concentration and one can be of your choosing (within your concentration or not). As a rule for all concentrations: Two electives must focus on different world areas (e.g., "Cultures of South America," "Cultures of East Asia," etc.). By advisement, one elective may be taken outside Anthropology. You will find the complete list of courses for each concentration on the subsequent pages of this document.

Field Engagements

Beyond coursework, all Anthropology majors must complete a series of "field engagements," emphasizing outside-the-classroom learning/participation and professional orientation. Majors use the Field Engagements Portal (FEP) to keep track of progress toward satisfying field-engagement requirements. The FEP has detailed information on exactly what must be done to satisfy each of the requirements, but here is a summary of what must be accomplished by the end of the fall semester of your senior year:

- 1. Attend one meeting of the student Anthropology Club.
- 2. Attend <u>six</u> qualifying department events, each with follow-up brief. (Note that we offer *at least four such events each semester*, so there are plenty of options.)
- 3. Attend one Capstone Seminar Symposium prior to your senior year (that is, prior to the year in which you present your own capstone research project).
- 4. Complete a bibliographic research training session from Sojourner Truth Library. *
- 5. Complete research ethics training module (CITI). *
- 6. Professional development activity 1: Career Resource workshop on CV/resume preparation.
- 7. Professional development activity 2: Professional academic organization explorations

^{*} The activities needed to satisfy these two requirements are built into "Research Methods in Anthropology" course, so as long as you take this course, you'll be set on these field-engagement requirements.
