Dear all,

As spring break approaches, there are a variety of things to keep in mind.

All majors - Don't forget that you must be cleared by your advisor in order to register for fall 2025 classes. As you plan out your schedule, the following may be helpful:

1. To meet your Political Theory requirement, there are two options in fall 2025:

- POL210 The Nature of Political Thinking (3 credits, Online Asynchronous)
- **PHI270** Philosophy and the American Founding (3 credits, fully seated)

2. **POL346** - International Political Economy fulfills the IR Economics requirement (or upper division IR elective) but does not require macro/microeconomics as a prerequisite.

In addition, we will be welcoming Prof. Jeff Sherman who will join us in fall 2025. Among the courses he is offering is a course on the Middle East, something we haven't been able to offer in a long time (read about him in the newsletter). Prof. Dowley is offering no classes this fall as she will be on sabbatical leave for the 25-26 academic year.

Some important additional information:

- The GEP (Global Engagement Program) is becoming available as a fall, spring or summer opportunity (more details in the newsletter). However, as of spring 2026, the GEP will no longer fulfill the Seminar requirement.

- Internships: You may count a maximum of 9 internship credits towards our majors and 3 credits towards our minors.

This newsletter also provides information about upcoming talks this spring. Also note the information on internships and funding opportunities available to you. Finally, consider joining the PSIR club. I urge you all to get involved, attend a talk and learn about new opportunities. If you have questions, contact your Major advisor or me. We are always ready to assist.

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Interview with a Professor

Meet the department's newest addition **Professor Jeff Sherman** By Sadie Leia Watkins

Jeff Sherman will be joining the faculty of the Political Science and International Relations department as a new professor this coming fall semester. Professor Sherman grew up in Colorado and pursued his undergraduate studies in Portland, Oregon at Lewis and Clark College, where he majored in International Affairs. After he graduated, he moved to New York City and worked as a study abroad advisor at the Council on International Educational Exchange (CIEE). He then moved on to work at the University of New Hampshire as a study abroad advisor, where he also obtained his Masters degree in Political Science. Finally, he completed his Ph.D. at the University of California at Santa Cruz in International Relations: his research focused on military innovation, more specifically the use of drone warfare and what it means to have autonomous weapons systems and how those fold into politics. He continues to research this today. He has previously taught at SUNY Farmingdale, Iona University, Stevens Institute of Technology, and as a visiting professor at the University of Massachusetts Boston. He is currently a visiting Professor at Berry College in Rome, Georgia.

Professor Sherman will be taking on a number of courses, including Introduction to

International Politics, International Relations of the Middle East, and War and International Politics. In the spring, he will be teaching the U.N. Semester (taking over from Professor Ozler) and Politics of Environment and Development. He has a number of tactics when tackling each course he teaches. For the Intro course, he tries to point out how interdisciplinary it can be; he tries to offer a kind of sampler platter to give students an idea of how it can tie into every field of study. He also tries to incorporate short videos for each aspect (e.g. globalization, climate change policy, etc.) of the course. In the advanced classes, he will have them be more reading intensive, and will expect students to come prepared to have interesting discussions around the reading. He will also use simulations of mock scenarios, such as a U.N. level meeting about climate change negotiations.

Professor Sherman is looking forward to returning to New York. He is excited to hang out in the Hudson Valley and enjoy the nature that is all around. Upcoming Events

GEP Changes



Changes are coming to the Global Engagement Program next year! Read the interview with Professor Ozler below to find out what!

What should students be looking out for regarding the Global Engagement Program?

The GEP is going year round starting this Fall 2025. We anticipate the Fall and Spring full semesters (12-15 credits): 3 credits from Global Engagement Seminar, 3 credits from Research Colloquium (will no longer count toward Senior Seminar starting in Spring 2026), and 6-9 credits GEP Fieldwork from a globally engaged internship. See our website for past internship sites ranging from Council on Foreign Relations to the United Nations to the IRC. Summer program will be 8 credits Fieldwork only. The student will be able to take advantage of many different programming in the organizations that the internships take place as well as professional development opportunities that the program offers.

What made you decide to dedicate your time fully to the GEP?

The program offers great opportunities for students to find their pathway into their careers in international affairs. Having a year round program will allow for more of our students to take advantage of the great internships at the United Nations and beyond.

What does your change of focus mean to your future in the department?

I will always be in the department and be available to contribute to the life of the department. My office, JFT 912, is always open to all students.

What should students know about the classes you typically teach, but no longer will?

Since 1978 our department has been offering the the United Nations semester class. We will continue this tradition without a break. For Spring 2026, I will be running the Global Engagment Program in NYC. And the United Nations Semester course that I traditionally would teach, will be taught by a new faculty member, Jeff Sherman. Dr. Sherman comes to us with many years of experience in teaching. He is a specialist in International Security and Technology. He has used creative teaching methods such as simulations in the past and is excited to teach the UN Semester course.

The Global Engagement Program (GEP) offers academic coursework related to global issues and a field experience through *internships*. New York City offers a wealth of opportunity for students to gain hands on experience in the world of international affairs. The presence of the United Nations Secretariat and offices of all UN related organizations offers possibilities for students in many fields of study related to global affairs including education, the arts, the social and natural sciences, and business. GEP offers an opportunity to have a global experience while remaining within New York state.

Students obtain a globally engaged and internationally focused internship in New York City, attend weekly seminar and colloquium and conduct a major research project. The goal of this course is to gain field experience in international affairs. Students will be able to demonstrate multicultural and interpersonal communication skills and become fluent in the current state of international relations including UN and affiliated organizations as well as international non-governmental organizations.

Applications are considered on a rolling basis and a maximum of 20 students will be admitted to the program. We strongly encourage students to apply early.

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Internship Funding Opportunities for 2025! Living Internship Stipend

Enables students to participate in an unpaid internship or curricular applied learning in public service and high-demand non-profit sectors related to their major and/or future career goals, but that is not required by their major.

Award: Up to \$3,000

Campus Auxiliary Services Stipend (CAS)

Supports students involved in a semester-long internship or student teaching placement that is required by their major. Award: Up to \$2,000 for fall/spring; Up to \$3,000 for summer

Applied Learning Travel Grant

Supports students who are completing an internship or applied learning experience, including student teaching, that is required by their major and are commuting more than 15 miles one way. The grant is designed to cover travel expenses.

Living Internship Stipend

Award: \$500 per student
